SOMETIMES THEY COME BACK AGAIN & AGAIN& AGAIN...

Those that say the only definites in life are death and taxes obviously don't read a lot of comic books. Death not only has physical form in comics but he/she/it apparently doesn't take the job too seriously or else there wouldn't be a revolving door installed in the afterlife. Comic book characters die and come back from the dead on an almost weekly basis. The only characters that actually stayed dead were Uncle Ben, Jason Todd & Bucky, the latter two recently made their returns.

While there is a part of every fan, myself included, that longs to see favorite heroes return. I feel it demeans the character to do so; especially if there death served a purpose or was truly tragic. One of the best Spiderman stories I have ever read was the death of Aunt May . Granted that story was part of the whole Clone Saga, but let's not delve into that right now. At the time I felt that issue was a very moving and poignant part of the Spiderman mythos. The fact that it was erased from continuity showed not only a lack of creativity, but served only to, in my opinion, stifle the character of Peter Parker. Some may argue that May is one of the most integral parts of Spiderman's existence, which is why I feel her death should have been honored. The same can be said of Jason Todd (Robin II), Ted Kord (Blue Beetle II), and Barry Allen (Flash II), just to name a few, who have returned in one form or another, thus nullifying their heroic / meaningful deaths.

Some Golden Age heroes such as the Justice Society seem to be immune to death as they are still quite active 60+ years after their hey day. When will this end? We had a Silver Age of comics where the second generation of heroes, such as Hal Jordan, and Barry Allen, replaced their Golden Age counterparts. Yet, most of these characters are still active, or pop up every year or so for some "Earth shattering" story. Comic books are stuck in a rut, we can't let go of the past and it has gone on too long. There may only be a few exceptions to this but those exceptions show that it can work. Barry Allen was replaced by Wally West (a more popular character) who in turn was replaced by Bart Allen, and I wouldn't have it any other way. The strength and importance of a characters legacy isn't in how long we can keep them alive, but in how they are remembered.

Finally this brings me to Captain America, who as we all know "died" recently. This event was not only featured on the Colbert Report, but made the national news as well. Now Cap is one of my all time favorite Marvel characters, but I'm not really concerned with his death. Captain America is one of the most recognizable Marvel characters and unless they (Marvel) had a new backbone installed, he won't be dead long. As a matter of fact I don't think he is dead at all. For those that have followed Civil War and have read Captain America #25

I imagine you, like myself, suspect something is fishy. The whole ordeal with Cap surrendering and then being gunned down in front of the courthouse by someone close to him.... C'mon! Some one *cough* Fury *cough* set all this up and faked the death. Now as I am writing this the issue containing his death has only just been released and he may be back before you read this, thus proving my point.

I for one am tired of all the major events that amount to nothing. Ever wonder why the mainstream can't take comics seriously? Because we as readers have a hard time taking these characters even remotely serious when they can't die? Granted comic books are a set in a fantasy world where people wear capes and fight super villians, so there has to be some suspension of disbelief, but the no death rule stretches it a bit too far. How can we call these "people" heroes when they don't really have anything to lose? Let the dead stay dead! R.I.P Cap.

I've even heard that people who bought PS3s to sell on the internet are returning them to the stores unopened because no one wants them. Yet the Wii is still hard to find nearly 2 months after Christmas, and I know because I have been looking.

Although, I have seen no official statement from Sony I

have heard rumors that they are going to drastically drop the price of the PS3 just to move the existing inventory. But is this too little too late? Some fans feel Sony has already burned them with what many view as a calloused attitude towards the very people that made the Playstation the number one console for so long. Can they make it all better now with a lower price? Unfortunately I think they can. We consumers tend to have short memories when it comes to the wrongs perpetrated by corporations. In 6 months all we will remember is the PS3 was expensive and hard to find at launch and so we will probably flock to the stores in droves to get them when the price is lowered. Sure a move like this will cost Sony tons of money (Microsoft did it with the original Xbox), but the spike in sales will make up for it, and then they will likely release a more cost effective, slimmed down version to recoup any losses. The technology will probably be cheaper in a few months and they will

be able to manufacture new consoles at a fraction of the cost.

Even if the reports of the PS3 lagging in sales are true, in the end Sony will not completely lose and may even come out on top. Although, by that time, most of us will have a 360 or

Wii as our primary system, the PS3 will still have a place in many homes as the second system.

While I am not an industry insider and not privy to a great deal of information, my personal feeling is that Sony did botch this launch. No

one I know has or currently plans to buy a PS3, most are opting to get a Wii or 360 instead. A few people have told me they maybuy a PS3 when/if the price is lowered to a reasonable level, but for now they are happy with their 360's and Wii's.

 Palladium is reportedly almost back on their feet after last years close call. Fan support was overwhelming and is one of the main reasons for the company's financial turn around.
- Did anyone else catch the appearance of Stan "the man" Lee in the Feb. 19th episode of Heroes? It was only a brief one line cameo but it was definitely Stan.
- As seen in Marvel's Civil War, Captain Marvel is another character that has returned from the dead. From what I hear he's not a clone but a time displaced version of the character and during the war he was on Iron

For months I have been praising Marvel and the Civil War mini-series. I eagerly awaited each issue, put it on the top of my new comic stack and read it at the first opportunity. A few times I even read it in my car before I left the comic shop parking lot. To put it simply I just couldn't wait to see what happened next. Now to Marvel's credit it has been a very long time since they have produced a book that actually drew me in the way Civil War did, I felt that the story was just that good.

The ideas in Civil War seem to mirror those of the real world. If superheroes were real would we tolerate them running around, placing innocent bystanders in harms way and causing massive amounts of damage, yet having almost no accountability? In our litigious society I seriously doubt that someone would put up with Spiderman slamming the Green Goblin through their

front window and not being able to do anything about it. We would demand that they make their identities public. and then we would worship them and pay them ridiculous amounts of money, like we do with all celebrities. Not to mention that the paparazzi would hound them until they uncovered everyone's secret identities anyway. On the other hand I don't think many people that acquired powers would hide behind a mask. Almost everyone wants to be rich and famous, which is why so many people flock to the increasing number of reality shows. People with powers would want to show off like everyone else.

I got home from the comic shop last night and immediately tore into the last issue of the series that had not only gotten my attention but the media's as well. Issue 7 started off right where 6 left off, Captain America's team throwing down against Iron Man's team in the negative zone prison.

The creative team is to be commended on how they handled the first half of this issues. The panels jumped from character to character creating a sense of urgency and confusion, exactly how a fight between that many characters should feel. But then the story took a turn that I didn't agree with. As Shield tried to close both teams in the negative zone, Cloak teleports everyone to the center of New York. From there the battle gets turned up a few notches as Namor and an army of Atlanteans show up and join Cap's team. Now Iron Man and his merry men are outgunned. There are several memorable scenes during this part of the story, but my favorite was Hercules taking the Thor clone /cyborg's hammer and using it to smash the clone's head in. declaring that it was no Odinson. The fight finally culminated in a battle between Cap & Iron Man. Do to a little "fighting dirty" Cap gets Iron Man on the ropes, only to be stopped as a bunch of

civilians, thus preventing Cap from delivering the final blow. (This seemed like a cheesy rip off of the scenes I hated most in the Spiderman movies. "You mess with one of us you mess with all of us".. blah..) It was at this point that Cap realizes what he has done and commands his team to stand down as he surrenders. The rest of the issue is just Tony Stark patting himself on the back. What the!?!

What started off as one of the best events Marvel has done in a while kind of ended with a whimper. Granted I am a bigger fan of Captain American than Iron Man. and I sincerely didn't mind that Cap's team lost, I expected it. The part that bothered me was that Cap gave up. It is scary how much this reflected our world today. For the sake of security many of us are willing to give up a few basic liberties to get the job done. Yet those liberties are the very thing that makes this country great. Which is really what Cap was

fighting for, after all his secret identity is public knowledge. This fight was a matter of principle not legalities. Funny how a comic book was able to convey such an important lesson. Sure this all took place in a make believe world, but the moral still rings true. I am disappointed that the "bad guy" won this time and what that says about the mind set of America.

I will go on following the story as it continues to develop in the Initiative and through out the Marvel Universe, even if it is only to see what happens. Civil War was apparently the first act in a much larger story, so there will hopefully be more twists and turns coming over the next year. I guess I just set my expectations a little too high for this story, and when it didn't deliver I felt cheated. I'm sure that there are some who disliked the whole event and others that felt it was near perfect, but either way the story did accomplished one thing, it got people's attention. Which is usually a good thing for the comic book industry.

SUPERHEROES AND LITERATURE

While we all know that most geeks love to read, just look at how many sci-fi and fantasy novels are sold each year, there is a whole geeky topic that is rarely covered in serious literature, superheroes. Sure people with powers are seen daily on our televisions, movie screens, t-shirts and, of course, comic books but rarely are they translated into characters in mainstream literature. Granted comics are a form of literature in and of themselves, but they are a more visual form that is not widely respected. Do publishers and writers not consider superheroes to be worthy of such an honor as to sit on the shelves next to Tom Sawyer and Harry Potter? Perhaps they believe that people that read comics simply can't appreciate a book with out pictures. I hope the truth is that superheroes are, for the most part, over looked and not because the literary community is too snobbish to include a genre that is a staple of American culture.

Any comic book fan probably knows about Michael Chabon's book, and there are a plenty of novelizations of popular comic book characters, but that's about it. No one out there seems to be coming up with original characters. There were countless wizards in novels before Harry Potter arrived on the scene, so why can't authors do the same with superheroes?

This got me to thinking and when you get to thinking about something there is really only one place you can look; the one place that contains the collective knowledge of the human race, the internet. (I guess you could just go to the library, but that takes a while and you would just end up using the library's computers to get on the internet anyway.)
