Mr. Jordan had been diagnosed with cardiac amyloidosis, and though he remained optimistic, telling fans not to worry, he eventually succumbed to the illness.

His passing left many fans saddened and wondering about the fate of the Wheel of Time series. According to numerous sources the 12th and final book of the series will be published. The book that Jordan gave the working title of *A Memory of Light*, will be completed using notes and recordings left

by Jordan. He reportedly shared many of the books details with those close to him to make sure the series ended as he had planned. It has been mentioned that the book will be over 1500 pages in order to tie up the numerous plot threads.

- 1. <u>Silent Hill (VG)</u>: Personally this is the spookiest game I have ever played.
- 2. Monte Cooke's World of Darkness (TTRPG): This is

a fairly new entry but definitely worth checking out.

3. Call of Cthulhu (TTRPG):

A true classic and probably the best horror themed rpg on the market.

- 4. **Resident Evil 2 (VG):** For me this is the best in the series.
- 5. Heroes of Horror
 (TTRPG): This D&D supplement is great for the GM wanting to run a horror themed session.
- 6. Darkness & Dread (TTRPG): This d20 supplement put out by Fantasy Flight Games is an excellent choice for running a spooky, low magic fantasy game.

- 7. Arkham Horror (BG): If you don't own it, buy it!
- 8. Horroclix (MG): I'm not a big mini's game player but I have played this a few times and the figures are pretty cool.
- 9. Call of Cthulhu (VG): This X-box game definitely captures the feel of a Lovecraftian tale.
- 10. Buffy the Vampire Slayer
 (TTRPG): The rules are simple enough and the game is pretty fun. Definitely a good choice for a little Halloween one shot game.

20 Questions with Hyper-Strike

HS: What's Dragonball Z??? True A: DRAGONBALL Z HAS INFLUENCED EVERY SINGLE AREA OF MY ENTIRE LIFE!!!!! So, it was obviously impossible not to let it resonate (deeply) in the character of Hyper-Strike. Of course, the Hyper-Hyper Blast is a tip of the hat to the Kamehameha. Toriyama often gives things comical names in his comics, but the way they are executed in the comic makes them extremely cool. This is what I strove for with the Hyper-Hyper Blast!

<u>GG</u>: Was it intimidating to be under the scrutiny of a legend like Stan Lee???

<u>HS</u>: No way! It was awesome!!! I was truly glad to have someone so powerful and influential witnessing all my incredible deeds!!!;)

<u>GG</u>: The Defuser won the competition and will have his comic published by Dark Horse, have you been approached by other comic book publishers wanting to publish a Hyper-Strike comic book???

<u>HS</u>: I wish I could say YES!!! But no... No one is brave enough to face a couple of petty lawsuits from Funimation.

<u>GG</u>: What are your plans now that the show is over or have we seen the last of Hyper-Strike???

HS: Next year?!? That's a long way off!!! I have no idea what Sci-Fi's planning for us, they like to keep us in the dark about these things till the last second. But that's alright... I love surprises!!!

Where have all the geeks gone?

I recently got involved in a very good discussion with the gang over at the Nutgallery.com about why kids don't seem to be interested in games like D&D anymore. There was a lot of really good opinions from everyone, except jedijeff who said nothing useful (told ya).

After I contributed my two cents worth and logged off I continued to think about the topic. Why don't kids today care about table top adventure gaming like they did in the past? There are a ton of great games on the market and I would venture to say that we have some of the best games ever published available now. The quality of pen and paper games is probably the best I've seen in my nearly 20 years of gaming. That's not to say there were no good games out back then, some of them were great but a lot of them were less than stellar.

So if the gaming products produced are more diverse and of higher quality why are so few new gamers coming into the hobby?

I have a younger family member, we'll call him Tom, that would occasionally watch us play Dungeons & Dragons on the weekends when he was a kid. Since the rest of the group was also family it was decided that he was too young and he wasn't allowed to participate. Due to divorce and various other reasons that group fell apart and when Tom turned 15 he asked me once again to teach him to play D&D. Naturally, I said yes. He went to Gen Con with me, I bought him some books and he began sitting in regularly on game night.

At first everything was fine, I had introduced gaming to a new generation and he seemed to really like it. He made mistakes, which were understandable, but I began to notice that he kept making the same mistakes and asking the same questions. I asked him why he didn't know this stuff, after all he had read the book I bought him. Didn't he? The answer was he had only read the character creation rules quickly and skipped the rest.

I realized that reading rule books, creating characters and most other things that involve gaming can take a lot of time. This is something that never occurred to me because I, like most gamers, enjoy it. I

have bought books for games that I still have never played, just to read them.

Apparently kids just aren't into reading like they use to be. Sure a lot of them like Harry Potter, and a few of those kids may have made the leap to gaming, but for the most part reading ranks fairly low in importance. Plus there was a lot more time between Potter books than there is between gaming supplements and in some instances new editions.

• Booster Gold

I can not tell you how happy I was to hear about this book. It is no secret that I am a big fan of Booster Gold and Blue Beetle. So far I've only read the first three issues and though I may be a bit biased, they were great. I had been worried that they would make the book too serious, or too silly, but I found my concern to be unnecessary. The book has it's funny moments, it is Booster Gold after all, but the stories lean toward serious side.

Booster has accepted the position of the greatest superhero that no one will ever know about, kind of a multiverse/time stream cop. Basically he has to correct errors in the time stream. In the current story arc he has to save the world's greatest heroes from being eliminated before they were even born. So far he has been accepted into the Justice League and turned it down, peacefully defeated Sinestro and gotten drunk with Jonah Hex. In return for his services Booster has demanded that he be allowed to save his buddy Ted Kord. The teaser they put in the back of issue #1 shows Booster, Blue Beetle I and Blue Beetle III saving Ted from Maxwell Lord. There was also a teaser from next summers event Final Crisis.

All in all I think this book has the potential to be one of DC's best titles. You don't have to be a fan of BG to follow the storyline which is a plus for new readers. All in all I highly recommend this book.

Transformers

A lot of people complained about this movie, and to a degree I can understand why. Very little was the same as the old cartoon, there were more humans than robots and there were some extremely silly and pointless moments. To be honest I really don't care, it was a fun movie. Another reason could be that that kids are just a lot busier than we were back then. There are more after school activities, more socializing and just a lot more for them to do than before.

Technology is another culprit, in my opinion, that is redirecting kids away from traditional gaming. It is so much easier to pop in a game and play for an hour or two when you want than it is to read, plan and spend 4+ hours playing a pen and paper game. If kids want to play D&D they can play it online, or play WoW instead. The key is they can do it when they want, they don't have to schedule their lives around game night. Which also may be why CCG's and Mini's games have become so popular.

Another way technology has impacted gaming is that it is

now ok to be a geek, but only the right kind of geek. If you like gaming it's cool, as long as it is on a console or PC. Sure you may not get beat up if you chuck dice, but most people won't be interested in discussing your game with you unless it's on X-box. Plus parents are more than willing to pay over \$300 for a console or drop \$50 on a game, but not so willing to pay \$40+ for a rule book, plus dice, not to mention supplements.

We gamers are another place where blame needs to be placed. Anyone who has ever attended a con can attest to the fact we are, generally, a friendly bunch, but we also tend to be an exclusive group. A lot of us, and I am as guilty of it as anyone else, tend to be selective about who we share our interest with. Some of this may stem from self preservation, but it is still a problem. We tend to hold

our games very near and dear and no one wants an outsider coming in and telling them that what they enjoy is dumb, or childish.

I also think that gaming companies need to find new ways to promote the products they produce. Few non gamers to go game shops, so why promote there almost exclusively?

So as a gamer I may not be happy with WotC's decision to release D&D 4e, I have to give them credit for attempting to bring our hobby into the 21st century with 4e's virtual tabletop. Maybe, just maybe, other companies will follow and this will breath some new life, and bring new players, into this hobby I have enjoyed for so many years. A hobby that will hopefully be around to be enjoyed by our grandchildren. That is if they can still read.
